Design a 'Martian'

Produce a poster of an animal that can withstand the inhospitable conditions which exist on the planet Mars. In order to be successful, you will first need to research the unique physical conditions which exist upon this fourth planet from our Sun using the resources available to you within our library.

<u>You should aim to make your poster colourful.</u> You should also add brief annotations to your diagram to explain how your animal is adapted to survive on <u>Mars</u>.

Think of 6 famous people you would like to meet - they can be from history or now, or even characters from books you have read.

Imagine you invite them all for dinner:

- What dishes would you eat? Design (by drawing or writing) the menu you would serve them.

 What questions would you like to ask them? How do you think they might reply? Write your questions and answers!

The Zooniverse enables everyone to take part in real cutting edge research in many fields across the sciences, humanities, and more. The Zooniverse creates opportunities for you to unlock answers and contribute to real discoveries. You don't need any specialised background, training, or expertise to participate in any Zooniverse projects.

You'll be able to study authentic objects of interest gathered by researchers, like images of faraway galaxies, historical records and diaries, or videos of animals in their natural habitats. By answering simple questions about them, you'll help contribute to our understanding of our world, our history, our Universe, and more. Some ideas you can do while or after reading:

- Keep a reader's journal tracking your impressions of a book you are reading and what is happening in the story.
- #Read a series of books or short stories by the same author. Consider what the books have in common in terms of themes, characters and style.
- Read a series of books in the same genre (such as the Adventures or Dystopian). Create a poster of generic features, adding quotations from the books you have read.
- Research an author you like and create a series of Google Slides about him or her.
- Watch a film version of a text you have read and compare it.
- Listen to a book on audible (freely available at <u>https://stories.audible.com/start-listen</u> also available in different languages if you go to the bottom of the page and change your Country/Language setting)

Writing

- Keep a lockdown diary, detailing your day-to-day life and your feelings. Write as poems (a poem a day).
- Write a book for a 5 to 6 year old and illustrate it.
- Write the opening of a novel (no more than 300 words)
- Look at some famous paintings

 www.nationalgallery.org.uk/paintings/must-sees). Pick a painting and use it
 to inspire a story or a piece of descriptive writing or write a poem.
- Imagine you are a fish about to be eaten by a shark. Persuade it NOT to eat you.
- Describe your town a hundred years from now.
- Write a story where a teacup and a sugar lump play a crucial role.
- Describe how your pet sees the world in a poem(s).
- Write a letter to your future children, telling them all about you.
- Describe exactly what you see/smell/hear/etc, right now. Include objects, people, and anything else in your immediate environment. Write as poem or prose.
- A shoe falls out of the sky. Justify why.
- Start a story with a quote from a song in your target language.
- Choose an ancestor or a famous person from the past to write about or to.
- Begin a story with the phrase, "It only took five seconds to..." "Es dauerte nur fünf Sekunden.." "Il n'a fallu que cinq secondes pour.." "Solo tomó cinco segundos para.."
