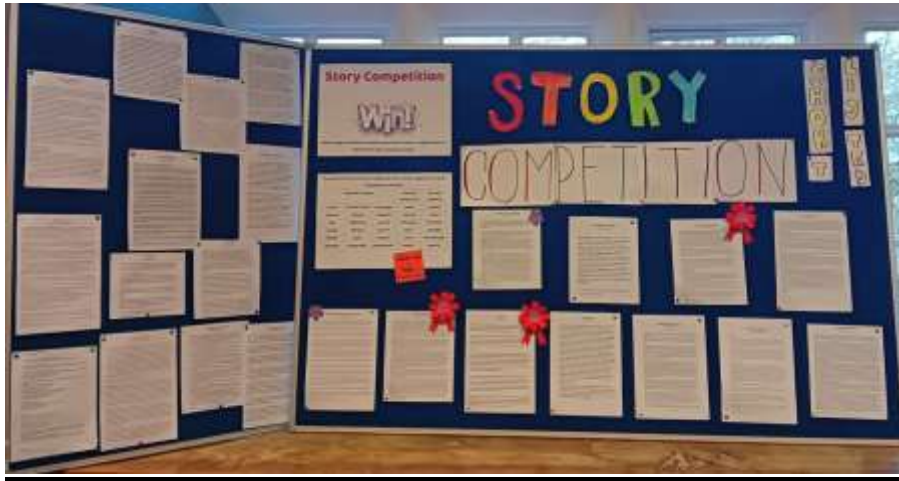
These are an excellent set of achievements, and all the students who participated should be proud of themselves. We look forward to seeing what they can achieve next year.

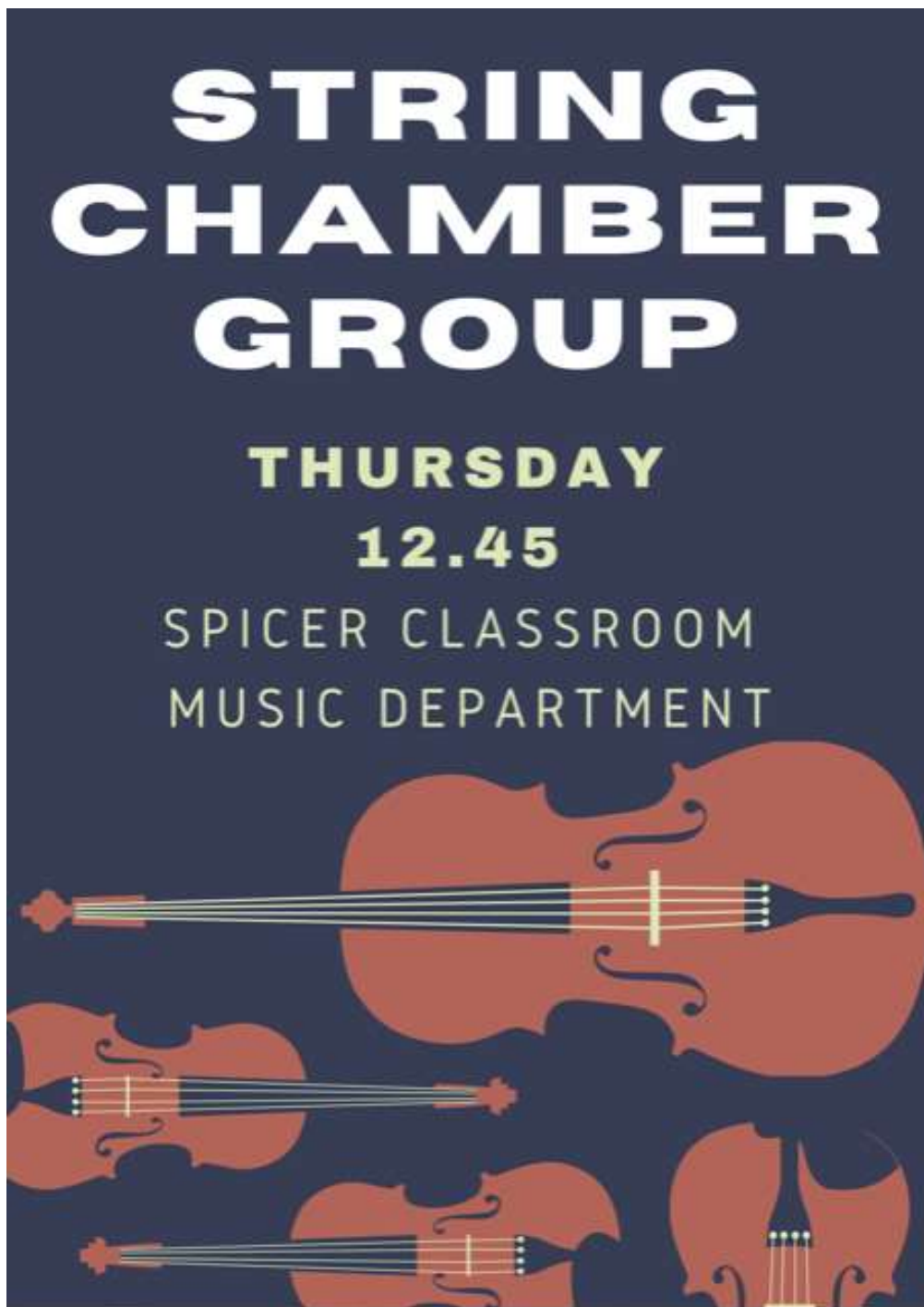
